# Initiative 434 pro-life abortion constitutional amendment

#### Protect Women & Children constitutional amendment

- Initiative 434 would prohibit abortions in the second or third trimester (after 12 weeks) except
  - in the case of a medical emergency or
  - where the pregnancy was the result of sexual assault or incest
- Initiative 434 is the pro-life abortion proposal
- this is essentially current Nebraska statutory law
- the competing abortion measure, Initiative 439 would allow abortions up to fetal viability (~23-24 weeks) – pro-choice abortion proposal

# Initiative 435 private school scholarship funding repeal

### Private Education Scholarship Partial Referendum

- Neb Const. art 7 sec. 11 prohibits appropriation of public funds for support of any private school
  - public education historically fundamental to US democracy
- 2023 LB753 authorized \$25 million/year in income tax credits for private school scholarships.
- Opponents got referendum petition on 2024 ballot to repeal LB753
- 2024 Unicameral repealed LB753, replaced it with \$10 million/year private school scholarship fund (\$100 million total).
- Initiative 435 would repeal the \$10 million private scholarship fund
- \$10 million = less than 1% of 2024-25 Neb state school aid

#### private school scholarship funding repeal: arguments in favor of repeal & against the scholarship program

for repeal: [scholarship program possibly unconstitutional?]

- public schools educate 90% of Nebraska children
- private schools not subject to same taxpayer accountability & transparency as public schools
  - Iocally elected school boards, public meetings, etc.
- selective admissions -- private schools can deny admission to some students; public schools cannot
- over half of Nebraska counties do not have a private school
- **for & against arguments** taken from the Neb Secretary of State Informational Pamphlet on 2024 ballot issues

#### private school scholarship funding repeal: arguments against repeal & for the scholarship program

- school choice issue: scholarship program gives parents a choice of where they send their children to school –
  - if they can afford the tuition and/or receive full/partial scholarship for private school
  - "educational freedom"
- repeal would hurt students who could benefit from a new school setting where they would have a better chance to learn & succeed in school (bullying, etc.)
- for & against arguments taken from the Neb Secretary of State Informational Pamphlet on 2024 ballot issues.

## **Initiative 436 paid sick leave**

#### Neb Healthy Families & Workplaces Act

- currently employer option regarding any paid sick leave policies
  - 15 states have paid sick leave policies; Neb does not
- Under Initiative 436, all employees would accumulate 1 hour paid sick leave for each 30 hours worked up to a cap or limit
- small business (<20 employees) employee paid sick leave would be capped at 40 hours/year [5 days/year] unless employer chooses higher amount
- all other employees paid sick leave would be capped at 56 hours/ year [7 days/year] unless employer chooses higher amount
- sick leave includes care of a family member
- would take effect October 2025
- would not apply to government employers.
- no explicit agricultural exemption

## Initiatives 437 & 438 medical cannabis

- Initiative 437 Nebraska Medical Cannabis Patient Protection Act & Initiative 438 Nebraska Medical Cannabis Regulation Initiative.
- 2020 medical marijuana petition kept off ballot because Neb Supreme Court ruled it violated the "two subject" rule.
- So the 2024 version has two parts: (1) [#437] patient protection act would make small amount (5 oz) of medical cannabis possession & use legal if pursuant to written recommendation from health care professional & authorizes health care professionals to assist patients with medical cannabis acquisition & use &
- (2) [#438] regulatory oversight would make medical cannabis possession, manufacture, delivery & dispensing legal & establishes Neb Medical Cannabis Commission to regulate medical cannabis production & distribution

## medical cannabis, con't

- health care professionals include:
  - licensed physicians
  - licensed osteopaths
    - are not chiropractors
  - licensed physician assistants &
  - licensed nurse practitioners
- Medical Cannabis Commission would include
  - 3 members of Liquor Control Commission &
  - up to additional 2 members nominated by Governor & confirmed by Unicameral
  - parental consent required for patients under age 18

## medical cannabis, con't

- medical cannabis includes:
  - marijuana
  - hashish
  - concentrated cannabis
- "cannabis" does not include hemp
- for: safer pain relief option (safer than opioids?)
- against: very difficult & expensive to police non-medical use of medical cannabis products
- possible petition circulation irregularities subject of Oct 29 trial. Go ahead & vote on ##437-438 if you want to.

# Initiative 439 pro-choice abortion constitutional amendment

- Protect the Right to Abortion constitutional amendment
- Initiative 439 would provide a right to an abortion up until
  - fetal viability (~23-24 weeks) or
  - to protect the life or health of the pregnant woman
- Initiative 439 is the pro-choice abortion proposal
  - Initiative 434 is the 12-week pro-life abortion proposal
- the two abortion proposals are inconsistent so if they both win, the one with the highest vote total is the one that is adopted.

### summary

#### Initiative 434 pro-life abortion constitutional amendment

- voting for #434 would put the current Nebraska 12 week abortion ban into the Nebraska constitution
- voting against #434 would not put the current Nebraska 12 week abortion ban in the Neb constitution but would not otherwise affect the current statutory 12 week abortion ban.
- remember Initiative 439 is the pro-choice "24 week" abortion ban
- Initiative 435 private school scholarship funding repeal
  - voting **for** #435 would remove the current \$10 million funding for the private school scholarship program
  - voting against #435 would keep the current \$10 million funding for the private school scholarship program

## summary, con't

#### Initiative 436 paid sick leave

- voting for #436 would require employers to provide paid sick leave to employees effective October 2025
- voting against #436 would not require employers to provide paid sick leave to employees

#### Initiative 437 medical cannabis

- voting for #437 would legalize medical cannabis products
- voting against #437 would not legalize medical cannabis products
- Initiative 438 medical cannabis regulatory system
  - voting for #438 would establish a medical cannabis regulatory system
  - voting against #438 would not establish a medical cannabis regulatory system

### summary, con't

- Initiative 439 pro-choice abortion constitutional amendment
  - voting **for** #439 would establish fetal viability/~24 week abortion ban in the Nebraska Constitution
    - & would override the existing statutory 12 week abortion ban
  - voting against #439 would not establish fetal viability/~24 week abortion ban in the Nebraska Constitution

& would maintain existing statutory 12 week abortion ban

the two abortion proposals are inconsistent so if they both win, the one with the highest vote total is the one that is adopted.
